RECRUITMENT REPORT

The Recruitment process has been going extremely well over the past few months. The support from alumni, educators, and current members has been outstanding. The list of potential members grew to over 90 qualified young men this year. During Greek Getaway we had 36 young men stay at the house. The high school seniors had a great time observing Eta Chapter members participate in the Greek Week activities. We have already signed our class of 23 young men for next fall and look forward to the quality of leadership and scholarship they will bring to the chapter!

I would like to address the fact that the recruitment process has changed greatly over the years. We no longer recruit all of our potential new members over the summer. The recruitment of our members is done over the winter with many of the recruits staying at the house in April during Greek Getaway. This event is our largest recruitment event. We are able to begin signing new members the first week of April and strive to have all members signed before summer break

A great problem that we are beginning to have is that our level of interest has grown much larger than our capacity. In addition, we have such a large number of Eta alumni that the potential legacy numbers have grown much larger than our class capacity per year. It is extremely important to provide me the names of prospective members (as early as high school juniors) now so we can contact and educate them on the benefits becoming an AGR during their senior year.

In addition, we are seeing more and more students attending community college because it costs less than tuition at Iowa State. Many of these young men are talented leaders but don't contact us until after junior college. We have evidence of this because in the past two years the number of junior college sophomores interested in the house has increased greatly. 






ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Jim Borel "1150", is executive vice president of DuPont and a member of the company's Office of the Chief Executive. He also has responsibilities for DuPont agriculture businesses – DuPont Crop Protection and Pioneer Hi-Bred. Jim was born and raised on a farm near Clarion, Iowa. He graduated from high school in 1974 and enrolled in Ag Business with a minor in Farm Management at Iowa State University that fall. In addition to active involvement in Eta Chapter, including being Pledge Trainer, Jim was a member of the Ag Business Club, Vice-President of Ag Council, President of the ISU Weightlifting Club, a member of the ISU Powerlifting Team, and was an Intramural Wrestling Champion.



Upon graduation, Jim joined DuPont in Findlay, Ohio, as a sales representative. From 1981 to 1987, he held a variety of product and sales management positions in Agricultural Products in Wilmington, Del., and the United Kingdom.From 1987 to 1993, Jim held various roles including manager, Agricultural Products Canada in Toronto, Ontario, general superintendent, responsible for agricultural products operations at the Belle, W. Va., site, and manager, global Human Resources for Agricultural Products.

In 1993, Jim transferred to Tokyo, Japan, with Agricultural Products as regional manager, North Asia, and the next year he was appointed regional director, Asia Pacific.

He returned to Wilmington, Del., as business director, North American Crop Protection in January 1997 and was appointed vice president and general manager of DuPont Crop Protection later that year. In January 2004, Mr. Borel was appointed senior vice president – DuPont Human Resources. He was named group vice president, responsible for the agricultural businesses of DuPont in February 2008. He was named to his current position in October 2009.

Mr. Borel is chair of the National 4-H Council's board of trustees. He also serves on the board of CropLife International; board of the Farm Foundation; board of Delaware Community Foundation; and board of trustees, University of Delaware.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

John Latham named AGR Grand President Award Winner

John is the third generation to lead the Latham family seed company, which was founded in 1947 by his grandfather. John literally grew up in the seed business in Alexander, Iowa, which remains the company's headquarters. In fact, his grandparents' former home has been remodeled into the company's office and his wife, Shannon, cooks up marketing ideas in the home's former kitchen.

But Latham Hi-Tech Seeds is no "mom and pop" operation. Thanks to John's leadership, the family-owned company is strong and growing. What had been a soybean-only company for the 60-plus years it was managed by John's grandfather, father and uncles, now also offers a full lineup of hybrid seed corn and alfalfa. In addition, the sales force has doubled over the last 24 months.

Latham Hi-Tech Seeds was formed in March 2009 as a result of an acquisition of the Latham Seeds by Latham Hi-Tech Hybrids, which John founded in 2004. For five years, John continued to work full-time in sales and marketing for the soybean-only company while he built the corn business. His hard work and dedication paid off when, at age 38, he was in a position to buy the majority of the family stockers.

This acquisition allowed Latham to remain independent at a time when global corporations were buying up regional and family-owned seed companies. John leads the unified Latham Hi-Tech Seeds as president, while Shannon serves as vice president.

Although John now runs his own company, he built his seed career from the ground up. After graduating from Iowa State University in 1992 with a degree in Ag Business, he spent two years as a production agronomist for Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. He then joined Latham Seeds in 1994 as a sales representative and was later promoted to sales and marketing director.

While attending Iowa State, John "1469" was an active member of the Eta Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho and served as VNR of Alumni Relations in 1991. He also served as Government of Student Body Senator from 1990-1992 and was a member of the ISU Ag Council in 1990-1991. John remained active in AGR upon graduation, serving on the Eta Chapter Alumni Board. He also served as president of the Eta Chapter Educational Foundation and the Alumni Corporation. In addition, he was honored as a donor for Eta's recent fund-raising campaign.

Also a leader in the seed industry, John currently serves as chairman of the American Seed Trade Association's Corn & Sorghum Division. John and Shannon also co-chaired the ASTA's 125th annual convention in 2008. At age 32, John held the distinction of becoming the youngest president of the Iowa Seed Association. John is active in his community, as well. He served as church council president and was a member of the pastoral call committee. In addition, John has helped raise thousands of dollars through his local Relay for Life sponsorship and for Sheffield's Octoberfest, which raises money for his community's Little League programs. In his leisure, John enjoys playing golf and traveling. He's a die-hard ISU fan and proudly holds season tickets to both Cyclone football and basketball games. He's also the proud father of two children: 10-year-old daughter, Elizabeth and 9-year-old son, Ian.

MOM'S JOURNAL

Just this week, I picked up the Charles Peterson print, "RFD", which depicts a farm child getting the mail. The father can be seen visiting with another farmer who stopped his buggy and got out to visit and the mother and another child are by the barn involved in chores. "RFD is one of Peterson's typical nostalgic Americana scenes.

Many of you may remember when your address included the letters RFD. I asked several in the chapter if they knew what RFD stood for and they did not. Are you able to recall what the RFD means? The answer is "Rural Free Delivery". Today the 911 emergency addresses have replaced the old RFD numbered zones.

I selected this print for several reasons, but predominately because this may be the last generation of AGRs who experience daily mail delivery. As attached to technology as students are, I am a bit surprised that the young men continue to anticipate mail delivery and check daily to see if there might be a letter! Almost every day I hear the comment, "I never get any mail." I remind them that they have to send mail to get mail, but I'm not sure they really appreciate that reminder – or that it is even true in this new age! Most get more packages from UPS or Fed Ex than they get letters and yet that letter or card is anticipated. The volume of mail received at the house easily fits into our mail box, unlike 10 years ago when the bundle or bundles of mail were dropped inside the door because the mail box was too small. Why the change? Much less "junk mail" – no more credit card companies seeking applications from every member of the chapter; bills are received and paid online; "letters" to and from home are done through email or texting.

This numbered and signed print will hang in the formal living room area of 201 Gray and is possible through the fantastic success of our Mom's Auctions. Once again, the auction this past February raised just under \$6000. Additionally, the auction proceeds make it possible to provide a scholarship to a deserving chapter member. Aaron Lorch was named the recipient of our 10th annual scholarship (\$750). What began as a \$500 scholarship will next year become a \$1000 scholarship. Other amenities purchased with these funds this past year included four computers, three food service warmers, computer software, kitchen equipment, and many miscellaneous items! (On Founders' Day, the AGR spouses who attend the Ladies Auxiliary gathering approve the budget for the expenditure of these funds. As the housemother, I am responsible for drawing up the proposed budget for this group of ladies to adjust and approve.)

In just two weeks this school term will be history! Our seniors are ready to enter the real world of work, and it is exciting to know a full class of new members is on deck! The time flies by as I continue to enjoy working with the men of Alpha Gamma Rho. May your spring and summer be fantastic!
