## **Eta: A Consultant Perspective**

Alpha Gamma Rho's meaning to me has continued to evolve throughout my time as a collegiate member in Alpha Zeta at Kansas State University and while serving as a Consultant on the National Fraternity Staff. One of my first experiences with another chapter, outside my own, was a roadtrip to Ames, IA for Farmageddon. Staying at the chapter house, tailgating and creating memories with Eta Chapter brothers gave me insight what Alpha Gamma Rho looked like outside my chapter's walls.

In my current role with the AGR Home Office, I have had the privilege of working with Eta Chapter for the past two years. While my visits to 201 Gray look quite a bit different than my first visit, the welcoming hospitality and genuine brotherhood remain the same. I have continued to be impressed with Eta Chapter collegiate and alumni leadership. A constant desire for self and chapter improvement exists not only within collegiate members, but also in my interactions with Chapter Advisers, Alumni Board and Mom Diane. One clear example, each chapter officer coming prepared to my one-on-one meeting, pen in hand, asking questions on how Eta Chapter can improve.

In my most recent visit this semester, I had conversations with collegiate and alumni members that may be insightful for a larger Eta audience to hear. There are many strengths to Eta Chapter and I want to briefly compare them to our chapters across the US. I believe strongly in leveraging our strengths, rather than focusing on weaknesses, to help make our chapters the best they can be.

Senior Leadership is one of Eta Chapter's biggest strengths that I believe can sometimes be taken for granted. Eta's strong sense of tradition may cause this comment to seem strange. As a national fraternity movement, not just within Alpha Gamma Rho, we are witnessing more and more seniors become disengaged from their chapter experience, move out of their facilities, choose not to run for chapter office and leave a vacuum of knowledge and wisdom. As a Consultant I have seen this trend across the country.

While the renovations to the chapter facility can transform it, I believe the biggest attribute this chapter house offers is the ability to house the whole of chapter membership. Currently, there is no other AGR chapter who houses their entire chapter membership under one roof. This provides so many benefits in brotherhood, sense of belonging and engagement of chapter members. I hope Eta Chapter will continue the trend of expecting members to live in your facility.

Iowa is a hub for agricultural production. Many Eta alumni graduate from Iowa State and remain within state borders because opportunities are abundant. This coupled with a chapter who is over 100 years old means Eta alumni are everywhere and engaged. The sense of duty is admirable among alumni with their contributions of time, talent and treasure.



Eta Chapter continues to be a role model chapter for our National Fraternity. I have no reason to believe that if we lean on our strengths, don't take them for granted, and continue to strive for self-improvement, we will continue to watch Eta Chapter prosper. I am extremely privileged to work with Eta Chapter and I hope I will continue to have that opportunity in the future.



## John "Jack" Nissly "500" Major: Agricultural Economics

In this edition of the Crescent, we will be highlighting the oldest living Brother of Eta Chapter, Jack Nissly. Brother Nissly is originally from Dallas County, Iowa. He first came to Iowa State University in the fall of 1945, where he began his studies within the ISU's Pre-Veterinary program. Jack's college experience was probably a little different than most. In 1945, World War II was nearing its end, however, the draft was still very prevalent. When Jack turned 18 in 1946, he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps and left for California for a year and a half. When Jack returned to Iowa State in the spring of 1948, he changed his major to Agricultural Economics and met his soon-tobe wife, Mary Lou, during summer classes in Beardshear Hall. Brother Nissly went on to graduate from Iowa State, marry his sweetheart, Mary Lou, a former Delta Zeta member, and after a few years, he ended up in the town of Iowa



Falls where he was a fundamental part in starting Nissly & Nissly, a professional tax and accounting firm. He still works alongside two of his sons, Mike and Roger Nissly. When Jack spoke of his time in the house, he knowingly stated, "Those guys in the House are lifetime friends; you do everything together... everything from the highs to the lows." The one memory that he will never forget was "pinning" Mary Lou. "Pinning" is now known as "lavaliering", which as most of you know, is essentially the Greek form of a promise ring. Jack left me with one last piece of advice that really made me realize how lucky we are to be a part of this house, and that is: "I can't give you guys any better advice than what you are already doing; AFP is making these young men learn respect and being courteous to everyone, which is exactly what our world needs."

## **Active Member Spotlight**

The Brothers of Alpha Gamma Rho wish to congratulate Brother Mason Lettinga for his remarkable success on the Iowa State University Dairy Judging Team this year. Mason grew up on a dairy operation near Middleville, Michigan, and discovered his passion for cattle at a very young age. He first began judging through his local 4-H chapter, and he has maintained that passion for livestock at Iowa State by pursuing a degree in Animal Science and enrolling in dairy judging classes. This fall, Mason became a member of the ISU Dairy Judging Team. He competed in three judging expositions throughout the fall; condensing a standard judging year into a single semester. His incredible focus proved to be pivotal during his debut at the Accelerated Genetics Select Sires Intercollegiate Dairy Judging Contest, where he was awarded High Individual Overall, and placed first in Jerseys, and second in both Holsteins and Oral Reasons.

Lettinga also went on to compete at the World Dairy Expo Judging Contest in Madison, Wisconsin. After placing only second in Holsteins, seventh in Oral Reasons, and 17<sup>th</sup> Overall at the team's second competition of the semester, Mason assumed a critical role in restoring the team morale. He encouraged those around him to stay committed and motivated. Despite the team's morale issues, Mason advanced to the North American International Livestock



Exposition in Louisville, Kentucky, where he placed first in both Brown Swiss and Oral Reasons, which earned him the title of Third High Individual Overall. Mason plans to remain in the dairy industry upon completion of his degree in Animal Science in 2020. After holding an internship with ABS Global as part of their Herd Genetics Division, he is strongly considering starting a career in either dairy animal health or genetics before returning to his family dairy operation. Mason is very excited for what next year has in store as Vice Noble Ruler of Planning and is also looking forward to inspiring other members of the house to become more involved in Iowa State's judging programs.
