He then went on to complete his Ph.D. in cow-calf nutrition and management at the University of Illinois where he also served as the livestock judging coach before coming to Iowa State.



John Armstrong "2189"

Here at Iowa State University and Eta Chapter, there has been an on-going push to promote entrepreneurship and business-oriented students. With the unfortunate decline in agricultural markets and unpredictable volatility, many brothers have begun to experiment with developing their own businesses. One brother in particular who has followed through with this desire and excelled in his early business endeavors is Brother John Armstrong of Williamsburg, Iowa. He is a Junior in Agricultural Studies and is the founder and operator of Custom Air Seeding.

Custom Air Seeding is, to no surprise, a custom seed application business that primarily focuses on cover crop,

small grain, and soybean application. They have a current customer base spanning within a 30 mile radius from Williamsburg, Iowa. They run primarily during the spring and fall and are striving to seed about 4,000 acres during this fall post-harvest season. He works in tandem with his father to cover these acres. John owns half of the seeding equipment with the other half belonging to a friend and former employer. John and his father, Brother Mark Armstrong, currently run the seeder as much as they can while the other partner manages his own swine and row crop operations. John plays a pivotal role as he works with customers, does all of the billing documentation and paperwork, and manages all maintenance on the equipment.

John is very enthusiastic about the future of cover crops and custom seeding. He states that he wanted to "help get crops in the ground when the farmer is busy elsewhere and do this task in a timely fashion". He has always loved to farm and work with his dad. This business has given him great exposure to custom operating and what goes into running a business. With the increased demand for cover crops in his area, he saw this as a great opportunity to start a business that could open a pathway to a career near his hometown. He would love to continue farming and this is a great head-start to achieving his dreams.



Here at 201 Gray, we are very proud of Brother Armstrong for his devotion to entrepreneurship and his great representation of Eta Chapter. Cover crops are a great innovation for the agricultural industry, and John is a prime example of youth in agriculture that will continue to push for efficiency and innovation. 2nd Century Campaign Surpasses 1 Million

With a push in fundraising, the Second Century Campaign has surpassed \$1 Million in cash and pledges, making it the largest fundraiser ever in the 100 year history of ETA Chapter. Congratulations to the alumni who have participated to date. Amazingly, this has been raised from fewer than 300 individuals and families. The potential to reach the committee's goal of 1.5 million is very realistic. If you haven't yet completed a pledge form, please visit the campaign's website at etasecondcentury.com. Surely you'd like to claim participation in the largest fundraiser ever conducted in ETA's 100 year history. Any gift, large or small, will be welcomed.

The building plans are being finalized and there have been some interesting pictures and videos posted on the etasecondcentury.com website. The planning committee is excited to see this project coming to reality after considering ideas and plans since August, 2014. A contract has been signed with Story Construction to be our construction managers. We will be receiving a Guaranteed Maximum Price contract from them in early January, with contracts finalized before the first of February. Once the frost clears in March, work outside of the house will begin with dirt work, foundation work, and perhaps even some early block work, all taking place before the students leave the beginning of May. Then a busy three and a half months follows with the project nearing completion by the time the students return in mid-August.

The project will provide solutions to a number of concerns we had when the alumni board initially began discussion back in 2014:

- The expanded dining room will allow all the brothers living in the house to eat together. Presently, a large dinner crowd will push brothers into the chapter room, disrupting the continuity of the dinner.
- The new chapter room will actually serve as a multipurpose space. Chapter room, Varieties practice, Yell-Like-Hell practice ... anything that needs a big space will be able to utilize the new area.
- The living room above the chapter room will be spacious and open with plenty of windows affording a great view of Rho Ave. It will also be arranged to have conversational groupings and study areas.
- The west side of the existing living room will be converted into a large boardroom. A large table with appropriate chairs will provide a meeting space for in house and campus committees to meet and conduct their work. It will be equipped to facilitate efficient meetings.
- The new glass walls will also provide for attractive trophy display in new LED lit cases.







- The study rooms on the second floor of the addition will allow the students to spread out from their current cramped study spaces. One of the study rooms in use currently used to be a hallway on the third floor (back in 1980).
- The new entryway enters on the same level as the living room and creates a new large, open stairway to the dining room. No longer will dinner guest have to descend single file down the winding stairway
- An elevator will be installed in the new entryway. Combined with a new ramp leading to the north door, the first floor and basement will become handicapped accessible.
- The ladies bathroom (butterfly room) will be expanded to two stalls, one being handicapped accessible.
- The Laundry room gets expanded to allow for additional washing machines and dryers and to provide folding and hanging space.
- A Kitchenette is added in the existing Chapter room to provide a spot for fixing weekend meals or late night snacks.
- All flooring on the basement level will be new terrazzo, allowing for easier maintenance and a durable surface.
- Air Conditioning will be installed throughout the house. No more unbearable activation ceremonies. (I know, we all lived through it and it made us better men!)
- A benefit of the expanded dining room is an expanded balcony above. This will allow for better seating options on the balcony and a friendly gathering place.

A summary like this looks impressive and the committee believes the new addition and improvements will be very impressive. Competition in the Greek System is very real. The Delts have built a brand new house, as did Sigma Chi. Farmhouse has completed an extensive addition and we hear plans are being made at TKE and Acacia for improvements. New dorms and an expanding apartment selection are tough competition also. The alumni board has been diligent and has been paying attention. The new addition's plans, long in the making, will keep AGR the premier living space for Ag majors at ISU. As you consider giving today, recall the good times you had while living in the house, and realize how many men have been made better by their AGR experience. Paul Kruse, a member of the planning committee, was heard saying, "My father once said, 'Don't wait to give back for your education until you can afford to give. You start right away because it will be the habit of a lifetime."



Above: Our 2nd Placing Homecoming Banner and some of the cast and crew of Lawn Display



Recently there were two improvements done here at 201 Gray that we, the actives and the Alumni Board, are very proud of.


The first was a major renovation of the bathrooms in the house. This project was completed during the Spring semester of 2016. They were in need of updating there were some new features added. The tile floor was replaced with

the durable terrazzo flooring. Some showers were widened for a more comfortable shower. New counters also feature granite counter tops with a tile backsplash. The lights are now motion sensor automatic lights, so there is no more light switch!

The second was an upgrade of our internet capabilities. Technology is always changing and this project helps keep us up to date with how we can connect to the internet. There are many online requirement for classes, and not to mention courses that are completely online. There was Ethernet ports installed in every room, so that the internet connection would be faster as the

WIFI would get bogged down with 90 guys on the internet with multiple devices. Recently the WIFI system was upgraded and is outstanding. The system is very similar to what is used on campus for their WIFI connection.
