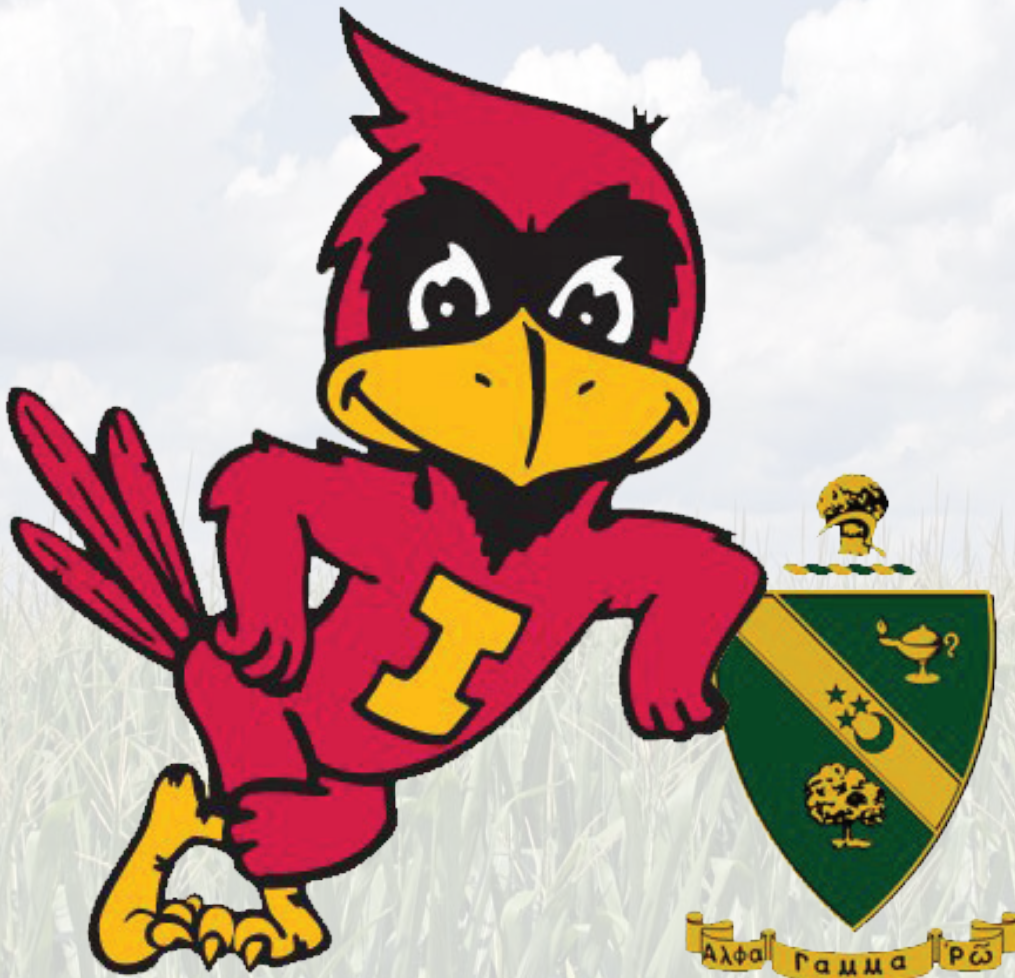

I am from the small town of Titonka, IA, where I was raised on a family farm in northcentral Iowa. I have the extreme privilege of serving 201 Gray as Eta Chapter's Noble Ruler for 2021. Last year, I served in the role of VNR of Recruitment. During one of the most unique recruiting years to date, we successfully recruited a class of 26 members, hailing from Iowa, Ohio, Indiana, Minnesota, and Illinois. These individuals are currently pursuing a combined 8 different majors within the College of Ag & Life Sciences. We are proud to have 24 of the 26 new initiates retained this second semester. I am very excited and honored to have been chosen to lead this organization and for the opportunity to represent Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity.

While COVID-19 has altered almost every aspect of life, some things will never change here at 201 Gray. With last semester's Homecoming events being cancelled, our members are very excited to participate in this year's Greek Week, where we are paired with the wonderful women of Alpha Delta Pi and Alpha Sigma Kappa. The NI class, and multiple upperclassmen have been practicing three times a week towards our lip sync skit of "Greek-XAR," a PIXAR-themed performance. This year's Greek Week is March 21st-28th.

We look forward to many planned events later this spring as well. We are hoping to be able to have either in-person, hybrid, or entirely virtual Mom's Weekend, Dad's Weekend, and Founder's Day, all pending university restrictions and regulations as the year continues and as ISU continues to monitor COVID-19 cases on campus. We are in the works of having an on-campus philanthropy this Spring, where we will be working with the women of Sigma Alpha to host this event.

Although this past year has brought much uncertainty, cancelled many events, and forced us to distance ourselves from those we care about, I want to thank each and every one of our alumni who continue to support the active members of our fraternity. Mom's Report

The Spring semester of 2021 began on 1-25-21. It started very much like the fall semester ended. Some classes are online and some classes are in person. Men are studying and attending classes online in the board room, formal living room, study rooms, and sometimes in the dining room. The mask requirement at the university remains the same and the social moratorium for the Greek community also remains the same. At Alpha Gamma Rho this moratorium means no large gathering at the houses. Events such as Mom's weekend cannot be held at the fraternity. Additionally, there cannot be any non-essential guests at the house. Essential guests are those that provide services such as repairs and inspections. While the social moratorium restriction is challenging, the men are dealing with it and are attempting to secure a venue on campus for Mom's weekend.

The Fall GPA for the house was 3.38, 45 men made the dean's list, 52 the house scholarship meal and 7 earned 4.0. In lieu of a Winter Crescent, a Christmas post card was mailed to the alumni. Consequently, it seems appropriate to include a brief recap of the Fall 2020 semester in this article.

Composite pictures and class pictures were taken as usual at the fraternity. ISU played football allowing a limited number of fans in the stands with most fans watching on TV. Some men had jobs, others went home to help with harvest and still others worked for local farmers. The Homecoming celebration was virtual; 27 members were awarded Legacy awards and 4 men received scholarships. The National Convention which was in August and held virtually was recapped at the homecoming celebration. The Eta chapter of AGR won 9 of the 14 awards and there were 2nd and 3rd placings as well as Gold Star Status Scholarships

During CALS (College of Agriculture and Life Sciences) week AGR men participated in the Olympics and brought the trophy back to the house. They also took part in Food on Campus, Hunger Fight, and Bacon Expo. Aggers brought 500 meals to local co-ops with the proceeds going to the Farm Crisis Center. The men also hosted an outdoor pumpkin carving contest accompanied by a meal with Sigma Alpha sorority. A number of men went to Stillwater, Oklahoma for the football game on October 24. Although ISU lost the game, the men reported that they had a good time.

Needless to say this has been a very different year at AGR. However, the men have made the best of it, are having fun and enjoying brotherhood. As this semester continues, members have again – after a 2 month break – settled into the routine of studying, attending classes in person on campus and online at the fraternity. The new members have had plenty of opportunities to bond over shoveling snow sometimes in some pretty cold weather. Taking classes online has made it easier for members to help at home during calving season. However, everyone is anxiously anticipating Spring, warm weather, and the opportunity to be outside.



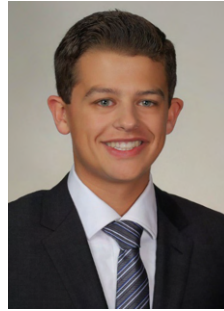

Alumni Spotlight

Mike Borel, pin number “1016”, grew up on a farm 3 miles south of Clarion, Iowa. On it, his family raised both livestock and row crops. Coming to Iowa State he was set on an engineering degree but knew coming back to the farm was something we wanted to do. He enjoyed the livestock side of the family farm and with Iowa State offering a strong Animal Science Program, Mike switched his major just before the start of his freshman year.

Before pledging AGR, he experienced rush week and ultimately landed on the decision of Alpha Gamma Rho due to his passion for agriculture. On Valentine’s Day of 1970, he was formally initiated into the chapter with Bob Swanson (Gobbler) putting the pin on his jacket. During his time at 201 Gray, Mike was elected to the AGR Exec Committee as the Scribe/Secretary and was a regular member of the AGR Kitchen Crew.

When asked about memories of the Fraternity and of his college career, Mike mentioned several. These included the Farmers’ Ball, Pink Rose Formal, Wrestling in the rec room, Greek Circle water fights, the AGR Lake, pig roasts, and building VEISHEA Floats. Others included bedding down the Farmhouse fraternity sleeping dorm with straw (having a key to their outside door), winning the Dan Gable Outstanding Intramural wrestler trophy (twice), traveling to Utah to win an NCAA championship, and getting a debut on the ski slopes with John Wood (Woody) and Kerry Lynch (Stick).

Mike’s post-college career began soon after graduation with accepting a job with DuPont. He picked DuPont primarily because an Eta Brother, Rob Dittmer, had joined DuPont a year before, and Roger Bruene, ISU Ag Placement Director, felt he had landed the best job of anyone. Mike would later manage divisions within DuPont including Australasia out of Sydney and Europe, Middle East, and Africa out of Paris. Later in his career, Mike was recruited by Sumitomo Chem to manage their Americas Business. Today, Mike has a consulting practice, Context Network. He works with agribusiness across the value chain and globally with strategy, insights, and management services. Mike has 8 Partners, 108 full time associates and another 250+ subject matter experts.

Throughout Mike’s life, AGR has had a very large impact. As an undergrad, Eta AGR enabled and pushed him to be a leader. As a corporate employee, AGR gave him important and influential contacts, mentors, and customers. And as an entrepreneur, he has had much encouragement from AGR Brothers from various chapters. He turned his passion into action as he was the Western Regional Vice President for 7 years. He still takes pride in wearing the lapel pin showing off his Fraternity to all.

Mike has a family. He has 3 kids who have also had great success in their careers, 6 grandchildren (ages 4-9), and a loving and accomplished wife, Roz (re-married 2019). Mike is also a big hunter. His passion for hunting has translated into a passion for wildlife conservation, specifically wild sheep (Ovis) and wild goats (Capra). Mike is currently leading a multiyear effort to double Desert Bighorn populations in California through strategically placed water catchments.

When asked about what advice he would give to the collegiate chapter, he offered the following. “Take brotherhood seriously. Learn from others. Mentor and teach where you can, work together, play together, CARE, share/be generous. Think win: win or no deal. Never stop learning, striving, improving – complacency will not serve you. The Platinum rule will serve you better as a leader and manager than the Golden Rule. Do YOUR part; encourage and help others do theirs. Greg Nickerson

Greg Nickerson grew up between St. Ansgar and Osage, Iowa on a diversified farm with three brothers (all initiated into AGR) and two sisters. He chose Iowa State University as his college of choice because of his interest in agriculture and communications and marketing.

“I had some influence from my older brother on my college choice, but frankly, Iowa State was the only game in town for me.” Greg says.

Greg’s career took him into the world of commodity futures trading for two companies, one in Cedar Falls, IA, and the second in Milwaukee, WI, which is where Greg still lives. In 1985 he took a job at Bader Rutter and over the years rose to be its CEO and now currently holding the role of Chairman. Bader Rutter is the largest agri-marketing agency in the country with nearly 300 employees and it serves stellar ag clients such as Corteva/Pioneer, Zoetis, and Case IH.

The connection of brothers on campus and the tight-knit bond among of all them are some of the great memories Greg has of the AGR house.

“The network created locally and nationally has been an invaluable asset in my development as a leader and has been really great for my business as well.” Greg says.

One of Greg’s mentors was Brother Brad Peyton, who unfortunately passed away several years ago. He opened the door to being engaged with the VEISHEA organization. In Greg’s junior year he chaired the event committee, and the leadership and management lessons he learned during that experience was priceless. It also taught Greg that loyalty still matters in a disposable world.

Greg decided early on that giving back was the right thing to do because the AGR house was so good to him. Financial contributions are certainly important, but Greg also feels it is just as important to give your time.

“I am currently serving on the National Board as the Grand Vice President, and I am loving every minute of it. Reengaging with campus life and our talented brothers has really been inspiring, and I encourage all alumni to get involved.” Greg says.

As for advice for underclassmen, Greg says to work on your soft skills. In today’s digitally-driven world, that is becoming a bit of a lost art. Knowing how to interact, engage and influence others “in-person” will differentiate yourself.

Recruitment Spotlight

We are currently in full swing of our recruitment season for the New Initiate Class of 2021. As we have been dealing with the obstacles that COVID-19 has given us for almost a year now, we have remained resilient and have adapted to the circumstances given to us in order to recruit a class full of bright new members. Currently we have signed 6 recruits, with the total number of recruits expected to land around 25 new members. Our current list consists of a healthy number of different represented majors such as Agricultural Business, Animal Science, Agricultural Systems Technology, Agronomy, Agricultural Studies, Agricultural Studies, and Forestry. Our list of young men also has a good amount of variety in terms of the states they are from, with some of them being Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, South Dakota, Missouri, California, Kansas, and Wisconsin. We have been very fortunate to gain more valuable names to our list from alumni recommendations, our scholarship on OneApp, and our interest form.

I was fortunate enough to inherit a well taken care of recruiting class from Cole Eden, our former VNR of Recruitment and current Noble Ruler, as he put in a lot of work last fall by giving several house tours, traveling to their hometowns on home visits, and developing strong relationships with all of the potential new members. Due to the lack of tabling and outreach opportunities due to the pandemic, I have tried to take advantage of giving as many tours and going on as many home visits possible to achieve that personal face to face connections with the PNM's and their families. As of the beginning of March, we have completed over 20 home visits and house tours throughout last fall and this spring. My assistants and myself also attended the virtual AGR Recruitment School in January where we learned about new recruitment tactics and bounced ideas back and forth with others from Alpha Gamma Rho chapters across the country. We have an AGR Recruitment Visit Day planned for Saturday, March 6th where we hope to bring 30 of our potential new members to Ames to interact with the active members, obtain information about being a member of Alpha Gamma Rho, and hear from a couple Alumni give their perspectives on being members of AGR and how it has continued to benefit their personal and professional lives on a daily basis.

Our list of recruits consists of approximately 80 potential new members and I plan on having the NI 21 class filled by the end of April, as May 1st is the University housing contract deadline. I am confident in my team's abilities and the participation of the active members of our chapter to help recruit a varied class of upstanding young men who have the potential to thrive during their time at 201 Gray. Our Alumni play a pivotal role in our recruitment process and I sincerely appreciate all of engagement and recommendations I have received so far. 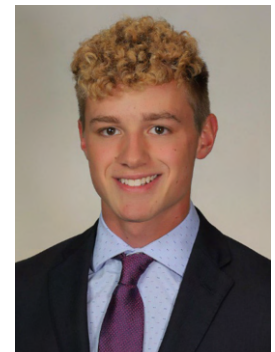
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
