Our NI class of 2020 has been filled, with 27 new members to be initiated come August. Currently, we have reached around 1/3 of our goal for this fundraiser. 
Mom's Report



The newsletter sent in February reflected the usual events and activities at the fraternity. Recruitment was continuing to go well, young men were preparing for midterms, practicing for lip-synch and planning Spring Break vacations.

Mom's Weekend February 28-29 was a huge success. Young men and their dates enjoyed a tropical date night on March 6th. On March 9th, the men of AGR hosted the 2nd annual Women Appreciation dinner. This was also a great success and an opportunity to thank all the ISU fraternity and sorority housemothers, house directors, female professors and other women who contributed to the fraternity. This included ISU President Wendy Wintersteen and Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Julie Kenney. The chairmen of the annual Spring Showdown, scheduled for the weekend of March 13-15, were extremely busy planning and organizing this event and everything appeared fairly normal at 201 Gray. However, conversations and worries about the coronavirus were starting to creep into everyday life.

Things began to change rapidly as more information about the coronavirus swept the USA and the Iowa State campus. On March 11 a recommendation was made by the Board of Regents supported by President Wintersteen and ISU administration to move online beginning March 23-April 3 in hopes of preventing the spread of the coronavirus. On March 18 we learned of the decision to provide only online classes for the rest of the semester. It was also announced that most of the resident halls at ISU were going to be closing. Businesses, schools, churches, bars and restaurants were closed or closing, and we were encouraged to "stay at home." Alpha Gamma Rho, and most of the fraternities and sororities at ISU made arrangements for students to move out over several days/weeks in order to honor "social distancing" which had become a very common phrase.

ISU Spring graduation scheduled for May 9th was moved to a virtual format and in President Wintersteen words "the spring 2020 graduating class will forever share a special place in history." The closing of the AGR house prior to the end of the semester was sad and disappointing for all members but especially the seniors. The NI class of 2016 is a cohesive group with strong friendships, strong personalities, and exceptional leadership skills. They will go on to achieve great things, but we all regret they will never get back their spring semester.







Recruitment Report

Like many things this year, COVID-19 threw a wrench in Eta Chapter's recruitment plans. As always, we learned to adapt, overcome, and be more prepared for the future. We are very excited to have signed 26 new members and look forward to welcoming them this Fall. These new members represent a vast majority of backgrounds, including 17 from Iowa, 2 from Minnesota, 2 from Ohio, 1 from Indiana, 1 from Illinois, and 1 that has traveled from Ireland to pursue a degree from Iowa State University. These 26 individuals represent a variety of majors as well, including Ag Business, Animal Science, Ag Systems Technology, Ag Engineering, Ag Studies, Ag Biochemistry, Forestry, and Animal Ecology. I believe this class is one of the strongest and most complete classes I have seen in my years as an active member and have high expectations for these future members of Eta Chapter.

Thankfully, by the beginning of my term, our former VNR of Recruitment and current Noble Ruler, Connor Hultman, had made significant headway on this class. We had already visited many potential new members and given them tours of our beautiful home at 201 Gray. Prior to the pandemic, our recruitment season seemed to be very typical. We started the spring semester by contacting new members, and scheduling visits to all corners of the state. We were able to host our AGR Recruitment Weekend in January, where we hosted 28 potential new members. My assistants put in significant work planning and preparing their recruitment skills by attending National AGR Recruitment School as well. As we progressed into the semester, it was evident that this was not going to be a normal year. We developed new recruitment tools, including PNM scorecards that quantify every potential new member's qualities and traits, and utilizing technology and social media platforms to connect with our recruits since home visits were no longer an option. Because of COVID-19, the university, and IFC-sponsored recruitment weekend was cancelled, putting every organization in a race against time to fill in-house spots before the May 1st University housing contract deadline. Because of our successful tradition of recruitment excellence, we were able to choose our 26 new members out of over 100 individuals that we were in contact with.

With this year's class complete, we have already turned our attention to next year's class. We were unable to table at on-campus and high school events that we use to build our names list, so we know that our alumni will play a pivotal role in our recruitment process by giving us names of high school seniors to pursue. 

This program consists of monthly visits to King Elementary and Moulton Elementary Schools located in inner city Des Moines, Iowa where our members interact and engage with the students about where their food comes from and the importance of agriculture.








AGR & Sigma Alpha Pairs Up to Attend National Leadership Conference - May 9, 2020

Alumni Spotlight Eric Peterson "1880"

Eric was raised on his family's farm near Fargo, North Dakota. Peterson is the oldest of three children. He has a brother - who also went through the house - and a sister. While in high school, he had experiences that sent him on the path to where he is today. One of which was when the wheat scab hit in 1995. He and his family started cleaning seeds for the neighboring farmer when he was 10 years old. He learned that no matter how hard the times, you can always turn it into an opportunity. Since then, he has witnessed his parents grow the family company into one of the largest companies in the region. From watching his parents grow the company as a young kid, he knew he wanted to do something great.


He chose Iowa State because of their well-backed, agricultural program and the opportunities it offered its students. He majored in agricultural business and minored in entrepreneurship. During his time at Iowa State, he was involved with VEISHEA as a general co-chair (2006). In that same year, the university offered VEISHEA more funding, creating a greater experience for all those that participated. Peterson's most memorable college experience was helping form the event as a VEISHEA co-chair.

Then of course he decided to join AGR when he was offered admission to Iowa State in 2003. He knew of the house from both sides of his family, some having lived in the house. When he was initiated, he was known as the "long-haired hippie." He didn't think he fit in very well at first compared to the rest of his members of the house. After a period of time of living in the house, it encouraged him to learn more about what he truly wanted to do in life. From this stemmed the idea of becoming involved with VEISHEA and learning more about entrepreneurship in the classroom.

After graduating in 2007, he was hired by Summit Agricultural Group – a once small diversified grain and cattle farm that is now known nationally and globally. From his hard work at Summit, he was recognized as an individual to be named on the "40 Under 40" list of 2015. This list recognizes people who have done a lot for the agricultural industry. Peterson is now the President of Summit Agriculture Group and oversees three divisions - ag production, ag investment, and farm management. He is married to his college love, Michaela, who he met during his time serving on VEISHEA and have two kids together (a 3-year-old and a 1 year-old).

A major compliment he just received recently was the Grand Presidents Award. This award is given to outstanding fraternity alumnus, under the age of 40, who have achieved remarkable success in their career and has made a difference in the agricultural industry and to the Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity. He was very humbled to have been nominated, but to have received it was such a great honor and incredible experience. Peterson has gone above and beyond in his career and what has done for agriculture and AGR.

His advice for collegiate AGR's is "Life can be so much broader, once you discover one simple fact and that is everything around you that you call 'life' was made up by people who were no smarter than you. And you can change it, you can influence it, you can build your own things that other people can use. Once you learn that, you'll never be the same again." He also discussed that sometimes a networking opportunity is equivalent to maintaining good grades in the classroom.

The Eta chapter alumni board and collegiate chapter exec teams have been working to refresh our Strategy to ensure our future preeminence. In the strategy, 9 key pillars were identified as keys to success. One key pillar in our strategy is focused on alumni relations and engagement.

To fully enable our strategy, we have implemented an alumni engagement committee to focus on the 3 strategy goals. In addition, the collegiate chapter has also created a new alumni engagement committee under the VNR of Alumni Relations to support the activities.

- 2) **Communications Engagement -** Execute an effective communication plan, aligned with the collegiate chapter, engaging **100%** of living alumni and/or spouses. Major communications: Crescent, ENewsletter, Alumni Directory, Website, Social Media
- 3) **Giving Engagement** Achieve **40%** annual/ongoing alumni giving engagement focused on: Legacy Fund and Estate Planning

360 Announcement

Brothers.

One of the important lessons that business schools try to impress upon their students is something we AGRs have always inherently (if unconsciously) known, the power and importance of a strong professional network. AGR has always provided its members and alumni a connection to a large group of individuals accomplished both professionally and personally. It's in the meaning of the moto (if you can remember that).

Our network, while strong and accomplished, is not always easy to engage and often depends on those you know well personally and by proxy those that they know well. It is rare that we find an alumnus unwilling to lend a hand to a fellow brother, however, finding and contacting the right brother has often depended on a little bit of serendipitous circumstances. Counting on this type of luck has worked well enough in the past (maybe), but we can do better. Even keeping updated contact information with our pledge brothers can sometimes succumb to the realities and demands of life. Keeping contact with house mates, alumni contacts, or collegiate members is of course even more difficult.

Whether it's looking for trusted advice about a new farm implement or technology, trying to find a company contact for some insight for interviewing or company business, organizing a social gathering or reunion, or just wanting to catchup with a missed friend, the inability to find the right brother and then contact has too often been a non-starter.

For a few decades, we printed paper-booklet directories to provide updates about the alumni to the alumni. These directories were not without their own problems, but even if they were perfectly executed and accurate the information was out-of-date in short time. It has been over 10 years since we last printed a directory. The Alumni Board discussed printing a new directory last year, but recognized there would be several issues in developing, printing, and sending. The board decided that something new needed to be done to better engage alumni and bring more opportunities from our network of brotherhood.

At Founder's Day this year that we announced our new web-based alumni directory (address below). We have partnered with 360Alumni to provide an Alumni Directory to all our alumni and collegiate members around the world. Other pages in this Crescent will describe how to access and use this directory, but it is intuitive and the 360Alumni team will provide support to our members as part of our service agreement.

While the "big" feature of this platform is ability for our Alumni to view and edit their own information and view that information of all other alumni, the site has many other useful features: the ability to create groups and events for communication and gatherings, collect donations and track fundraising campaigns, and in the future potentially post jobs or volunteer to mentor.

The site should supercharge our AGR networking capabilities. This is not intended to replace any social media platforms, and I don't expect people to be logging in everyday or even every week to check updates to the site. It will allow Alumni to contact each other individually or in groups and hopefully facilitate or re-energize communication to those who may have lost touch, to fellow opinion leaders or experts, or to fellow company or industry colleagues.

We signed a three-year agreement with 360alumni, so we consider the next three years an experiment to see if a platform like this is useful and beneficial to AGRs. At the end of the three years, we will evaluate and decide to continue this platform or something similar, or if we need to go in another direction. In the meantime, please provide feedback, comments, concerns, frustrations, or questions to The Alumni Board (you can find our contact information easily in the system).

Personally, I will consider this experiment a success if it facilitates more alumni suggesting meet-ups at events where there are likely to be several alumni present (Iowa State Fair, Farm Progress Show, Iowa Farm Power Show, Iowa State Bowl Games, Big 12 and NCAA Tournament, and many others).

Paul Kruse grew up on a grain and livestock farm in Franklin County, about four miles north of Hampton, and never thought about pledging AGR. He was active in FFA and 4-H and always planned on going to Iowa State to further his education, but was going to live in the dorms with a high school friend of his.

His older sister had four guys in her Hampton High graduating class that were in the AGR House, two guys in the House that were a year older and a number of Franklin County AGR families that were alums. Paul knew the Showalters, Browns, Lathams, Dohrmanns, Van Werts, Staleys and a quite a few others. Dan Frieberg was the Rush Chairman, that summer of 1976, and was on his way back from pledging Don Nickerson and Mell Taets up in Mitchell County. Dan and Dick Miller, an AGR active and neighbor, stopped that afternoon and before Paul knew it, he was the 1200th AGR to pledge Eta.

Paul had a fantastic four years at 201 Gray and life-time friends and connections are priceless. Some of the best memories for Paul were the Pink Rose Formals, balcony and Blue Room parties, Rook Haven, pledge skips, camping out for football games and the Farmer's Ball. He wouldn't trade those years for anything. Paul has met Iowa State alumni that are jealous of what AGR brothers have. Sometimes people take it for granted for what they have, but it is really special.

Sure, there were a few tasks that Paul and friends had to put up with, like Friday night clean-ups, pledge tests and pledge duties and etiquette lessons from Mom Streit but that made everyone who they are today. AGRs learned discipline, leadership skills, teamwork, responsibility and how to be a good Brother. Those times were also special, but just in a different way. For Paul, it wasn't always fun having to be back at the House on a Friday night at midnight for clean-up but the 4:00 a.m. breakfast at Sambo's was worth it.

Over the years Paul has been involved with the AGR Alumni Board and several of the capital campaigns so when the AGR Legacy Fund was established in 2014, Paul jumped at the opportunity to give back to AGR. You can't put a price on the friendships he has made, the never-ending connections to not only Eta Brothers but AGRs all over the country. Paul has met total strangers on flights and at conferences that somehow, AGR comes up and turns out they are either Eta alums or AGR alums from other chapters and immediately a bond is there. There's no way Paul could repay all the benefits he's been able to receive but he thinks everyone should give what they can and start early.

Paul's pledge class of 1976-77 has stayed in touch and they have a 5-year reunion of the year they were initiated. Paul can tell you exactly the day it was, February 11th 1977. They have Brothers from Texas, Florida, Minnesota, Illinois, Kansas, Colorado, and of course Iowa, that make it back to see each other. It's a great time reliving the days at 201 Gray. The AGR Alums get together, every year, the first Thursday of the Iowa State Fair and Brothers come from all over the country.

Paul's advice is to stay in touch with everyone and give back if you can. It's not always easy but well worth it.
