B.J. credits his family and surrounding community members for instilling in him the rural ag community values that have made him successful today. This strong agricultural community and an early involvement in 4-H fueled his passion for agriculture, leading him to pursue an Agricultural Business degree at Iowa State.

Brother Brugman was initiated at Eta Chapter in the fall of 2008. He quickly became involved in a variety of activities in the house and on campus, but VEISHEA was his passion. He was involved in leadership positions with VEISHEA all four years of college, including serving as the General Co-Chair for the 2011 and the 2012 celebrations. In fact, it was through VEISHEA that B.J. met his wife, Kayla.

After graduation, B.J. began working in a sales territory in central Iowa for Elanco Animal Health. In his short five years with the company, BJ has had various roles in sales positions in Iowa, North Carolina, and Idaho. AGR Scholarship Recipients

Each year the Eta Educational Foundation coordinates the selection and distribution of approximately \$100,000 of scholarships and grants to undergraduate members of Eta Chapter through collaboration with the ISU Foundation, the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, the National AGR Foundation, and the Eta Educational Foundation itself. These scholarships and grants are normally announced at the Homecoming and Founder's Day award ceremonies. This year, some of the spring awards made in collaboration with the College of Agriculture were not able to be finalized prior to the earlier Founder's Day in February due to the CALS award selection timeline.
