

I'm so incredibly proud to reflect on the academic efforts of the men of 201 Gray this past spring. Eta Chapter combined efforts to post a cumulative GPA of 3.47, crushing the university average of 3.19 among all undergrads, and placing us 2nd within IFC by .03. This strong semester academically included five 4.0's posted by brothers, and 47 brothers on the Dean's List.

This accomplishment came as no surprise however, as the hard work among the active chapter was evident throughout Spring 2021. As the university shifted back to more in-person classes, brothers did an excellent job of keeping each other accountable on going to class and taking full advantages of the resources offered here at AGR.

Alumni Spotlight

Perry Palmer grew up on a 500-acre farm near Keota, in southeast Iowa. Initially, the farm was a traditional hog & cattle/row crop operation but later developed into a large turkey enterprise which then became the core livestock operation.

No one from Perry's family or local community had been in AGR, however, when he went through Rush as an Ag Engineer, it quickly became clear Alpha Gamma Rho was the best choice. Because of his father's prior involvement in FFA at the state level and the Ag Council, his father had always stressed academics and leadership; traits for which Alpha Gamma Rho is known. As a freshman at ISU, Perry was also a State 4-H Officer and knew many of his counterparts in the FFA organization. When he arrived at 201 Gray at the start of Rush Week, Palmer was met by two State FFA Officers from the AGR Rush team. They were smart, persuasive and very accomplished – A reflective of a group he wanted to be part of.

During Perry's freshman year, he was fortunate to head the pledge class which allowed him to get to know his pledge brothers quickly, whether planning for a sorority event or partaking in a 2:00 AM breakfast after cleaning the house. During his sophomore year, Perry served as a Cyclone Aide. Cyclone Aides were representatives selected by the Dean of Students of Office (usually two from each college. They are the University's ambassadors to new students, recruits, and parents). He later became the House's first Summer Rush Chairman, traveling the state full-time recruiting incoming students and, more importantly, talking with their parents. It was a big change because freshman previously were not allowed to pledge until they arrived for their first semester of school.

Palmer graduated in 1973 with a degree in Industrial Administration. After graduation, he went on to receive his CPA and several years later he received his MBA. His professional career started with a firm which now goes by Deloitte. After working with clients in Phoenix and Southern California, he moved to the Bay Area where he became a partner with a growing real estate development company. His company redevelops environmentally impacted properties as new campuses for Bay Area companies. The properties are in built-up urban areas and their redevelopment involves many public forums; therefore trust, relationship building, resourcefulness and consensus are key. These were all traits he refined as Pledge Class President, Rush Chairman and my later years in the House.

When looking back at AGR, Palmer still believes the House sets a high standard for the caliber of its members and the expectations those members have for themselves. As for the Rush team he first met at 201 Gray, they and many that followed shortly thereafter, went on to hold top campus positions whether it be Ag Council, Interfraternity Council or Student Body President. They are today's leaders in Agriculture and the heads of many corporations. Though Perry's career took him outside the ag industry, his principles have remained and hold true to him today.

Perry and his wife, Terry, live in Woodside, CA, a small town south of San Francisco. They have an adult daughter, Lauren, that lives in Los Angeles. Perry is an avid football fan. He enjoys playing tennis and going scuba diving.

His Advice for all collegiate members of Eta AGR is this. "Enjoy your time at 201 Gray, it will go quickly. Take advantage of the opportunities to be involved in as many House Offices or other activities as your schedule will allow. It's a great way to get to know your brothers; they all were selected for special reasons before you became a member. It is said that to be successful you should surround yourself with team members that are smarter than you are. We all know that means people-smart as well as book-smart. At AGR, we have a house full of those team members, more reason to get to know them. I also cannot overemphasize the importance of relationships. After college is completed, it can be a differentiating factor in many settings and open doors in others."
