# **Alumni Board President Report**

#### "The More Things Change, the More Things Stay the Same"

My fraternity journey began in August of 1986, as my terrified and shocked parents dropped me off at 201 Gray Ave. In the last 37 years, I have had an amazing journey. In addition to 4 years of undergrad living, I served as chapter advisor for 23 school years and in 2017 became the AGR National Advisor Coordinator. In that role I have gotten to work with advisors from numerous AGR chapters across the country, and in my fraternity journey I have gotten to observe a lot of stuff. This Crescent article submission as ETA Alumni Board President will take a little different twist. I am going to attempt to outline key things that have changed and key things that have stayed the same at 201 Gray.

#### Things That Have Changed:

- 1. No VEIHSHA, No Rhomates, and No Varieties: The permanent cancellation of VEISHEA, the largest student-run festival in the United States, was a huge blow to Alpha Gamma Rho. The festival was ended by ISU President Steven Leath in May of 2014. The leadership opportunities provided by that organization and the benefits from serving that have been lost will truly never be replaced. The Rhomate program was ended by ISU President Martin Jiske late in the 1990s. It was driven by a "date rape" scandal at an ISU Fraternity (NOT AGR) and all "little sister" programs would be disbanded immediately lest the fraternities on campus would lose their ISU charters. Much like VEISHEA, the positive benefits of the Rhomate program will never be replaced. Varieties ended in the late 2010s simply by houses losing interest and lack of participation. I realize that for many alumni reading this, that is hard to imagine. For those like myself who participated in Varieties, it was a great part of the college experience.
- 2. Societal Trends Towards "Wokeness": Unless you are a part of daily campus life, it is hard to understand the evolution of, for a lack of better term, the "wokeness" movement. We live in a time where a simple poor choice in a brother's words/actions can have a horrible effect on his career and livelihood. We are blessed with having one of the most reasonable campuses regarding these issues. However, it is a constant concern. The approach of treating everyone with respect and dignity while avoiding things that you do not believe in has been a successful path forward.
- **3.** Increased Faith Involvement: The percentage of our undergraduate brothers who are actively involved in a faith journey is likely three-to-four times that of our historical participation. It's hard not to think that the prevalence of COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns and mandates have played a role here. There is a very positive trend across all denominations, and I pray that it continues.
- **4.** Improved Relations Between Eta Chapter and the National AGR Fraternity: Ok, to be fair it would be hard for Eta Chapter's relations with the National Fraternity to get much worse than they were in the late 80s and 90s. Eta is well into its second decade of a very good working relationship with the National organization. Eta brothers are always some of the largest attendee chapters at spring leadership conferences and national AGR conventions, and the effectiveness of our chapter service visits have been excellent. In addition, we have several alumni playing key roles in the National Fraternity. Grant Bargfrede is currently serving as Operations Director, Greg Nickerson is currently serving as National Grand President, and Jim Borel is currently serving on the National Board of Directors
- **5.** Modern Facilities: In the late '80s, it was safe to say that nobody joined AGR at ISU because of the amazing building. While the facility was adequate, it was not a strength. The remodel and addition project of 2018 led by Mike Nissly has blessed our undergraduates with a "first class" living experience. I can assure you that the alumni board is proactively working to keep it that way. The last 10 years has seen a dramatic upgrade in ISU Greek facilities, and AGR takes a back seat to no one.

#### Things That Have Stayed the Same:

- 1. Culture: Just like the late '80s, Eta Chapter is still filled with undergraduates in the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. With that comes the agricultural values of hard work, loyalty, perseverance, and always wanting to be busy. The culture is certainly about working hard to achieve a great college career and having a lot of fun along the way. This is aided by still having our senior brothers live in the house all four years. That fact has gone a long way to keeping our fraternity something our alumni can be proud of despite societal changes.
- 2. Job Market Success: I used to describe the ISU CALS Fall Career Fair as Eta Chapter's "Super Bowl." Winning in the agricultural job market has always been a priority, it really is the ultimate measure of our fraternity's success. This has never been a bigger strength than today. Most graduating seniors have full time jobs wrapped up BEFORE they leave for the Christmas Holiday. The number of underclassmen who have internships booked for this coming summer is too long to list. In numerous conversations with parents asking me about the benefits of having their son live at 201 Gray, I often close a fruitful discussion with this simple line: "If you want your son to get a great job after they graduate, you want them to live at Alpha Gamma Rho."
- **3.** Alumni Support: During the late 80's we were blessed with regular interactions with such prominent alumni as Marv Walters, Leo Waggoner, Wayne Tyler, Rollie Fergeson, and Charlie Brown, just to name a few. One of my best alumni experiences was to work closely with Brad Peyton during his time as chairman of the 1987 ETA Chapter 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration. Today our undergraduates are blessed with even more alumni support. Mike Nissly serving as Alumni treasurer and Dan Stockdale serving as fraternity legal counsel are great examples. Additionally, we continue to enjoy elite chapter advisor teams and our ability to recruit successful alumni to serve on our corporation board is another plus. The large crowds that we continue to enjoy for Homecoming and Founder's Day as well as the generous financial support to the fraternity are why great alumni support is something that has NOT changed.
- **4.** Campus Involvement/Leadership: While the organizations at Iowa State have certainly changed over the years, our brothers still are very active and involved on campus. Homecoming, IFC, Greek Week, CALS Council, judging teams, etc. are still being let by AGR's. Additionally, our upperclassmen brothers continue to win coveted awards: Nathan Behrends Greek man of year and CALS college BVCVBBN.

In closing, I hope you found these observations at least interesting. As alumni, you should feel very proud that Eta Chapter has continued to evolve in the quest "To make better men, and through them a better and broader Agriculture."

# **Alumni Spotlight**



Thomas L. Lyon "783"

This issue's Alumni Spotlight recognizes our late Brother Thomas L. Lyon (1940-2021), who passed away in March of 2021. Thomas was born to his parents Earl and Nellie in Toledo, Iowa, on September 12<sup>th</sup>, 1940, and was raised on his family's dairy farm along with his cousin William Zmolek and his brothers Howard, G. Joe, and Durward Lyon. Upon graduating high school, he decided to attend Iowa State University and join the Eta Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho. He graduated with a degree in dairy science in 1962.

A member of the New Initiate Class of 1958, Lyon was known for his heavy involvement in the Iowa State University Dairy Science program, and he was often found working at the university's dairy farm whenever he could. Additionally, he was heavily involved in the Dairy Science Club on campus, and he was a frequent contributor to fraternal events at AGR. Brother Kenneth Baughman remembers, "Tom Lyon was my [New Initiate] brother in 1958. He was an outstanding leader in the dairy industry and worked with dairy cattle research on the ISU dairy farm while as a student. His leadership qualities came to bear as President of the Wisconsin Board of Regents." Brother Lyon was well-loved by his fellow fraternity brothers during his time at Eta Chapter, and he was

a shining example of determination and dedication in a fraternity and university with no shortage of hard workers.

Upon his graduation from Iowa State in 1962, Thomas decided to forge his own path in the dairy cattle industry rather than returning to Lyon Jerseys, the family dairy operation ran by his father, Earl, and his brothers Howard and Joe. He accepted a position with Midwest Breeders Cooperative in 1967, working in marketing and communications out of Shawano, Wisconsin. Thomas was promoted several times during his time with the company, and after a merger of several dairy industry cooperatives and companies, he retired as CEO of Cooperative Resources International in 2002. Thanks to his leadership, the regional dairy cattle breeding cooperative that he had joined in 1960s would become one of the largest such organizations in the world.

Upon his retirement in 2003, Thomas would consult for the secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture. In this role, he advocated for the preservation of rural Wisconsin and protection of farmland in the state. In addition to this role, he served as co-chair of the Future of Farming and Rural Life in Wisconsin project at the Academy of Sciences, Arts and Letters, where he helped to report on statewide agricultural issues and develop policy recommendations for the state at large.

Those close to Brother Lyon described him as someone with a deep interest in the well-being of dairy farmers and the health of the rural communities where they called home. Beyond his career in the dairy industry, Thomas used his personal time to help rural Wisconsin and the state's dairy industry in a number of ways. As a result of his efforts, he was inducted into the National Dairy Shrine, the National Cooperative Business Hall of Fame, and the Wisconsin Business Hall of Fame, and he was awarded with an Honorary Doctorate Degree from the University of Wisconsin – Madison

Another passion of Thomas's was education. He truly believed in the importance of higher education, especially for youth from farms and rural areas like his own. His interest in higher learning was rewarded with a position on the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents from 1986 to 1993, and he served as the board's president from 1990 to 1992.

Relationships meant everything to Thomas. He emphasized getting together with close family, staying in touch with relatives, and supporting each other through times of adversity. He and his wife, Barbara, were true high school sweethearts, and they celebrated their 61<sup>st</sup> wedding anniversary in June of 2020. Upon his retirement from Cooperative Resources International in 2002, Thomas and Barbara moved to Cambridge, Wisconsin, to be closer to friends and family in the Madison area.

While his time in Wisconsin provided him the chance to pursue his personal and professional dreams, make a living in the agriculture industry, and build lifelong friendships across the state, Brother Lyon's heart was never very far from his home in rural Iowa. Friends and family alike heard many times about the "farm kid from Iowa."



Brother Thomas Lyon was a beloved member of the Eta Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity. His legacy has impacted the dairy industry in countless ways since his time at 201 Gray Ave., both during his time as a hardworking student at Iowa State and as a passionate advocate for agriculture in the state of Wisconsin. We are extremely saddened by his passing, and we hope to continue to honor his legacy in everything we do at Eta Chapter.

#### **Membership Development Report**



Spencer Collins graduated with a degree in Agricultural Studies here at Iowa State. On May 12<sup>th</sup> he walked across the CALS ceremony and was handed his diploma. Spencer grew up on a family farm in Adel, Iowa and is to return there upon getting his degree. Spencer always knew he wanted to come to Iowa State and had hope of receiving the honor of a bid to become an AGR.

As Spencer decided to come to Iowa State, he knew he was returning home. He saw the benefit of coming to a university to learn and absorb all the knowledge he could. Even though a degree was not necessary for his future, he came to get a four-year degree. Coming to a university can provide agriculturalist with business and management skills that are essential for running a successful farm. Courses such as accounting and marketing can help farmers develop the skills needed to manage finances, market their products, and expand their business.

With agriculture undergoing major changes on the technological side of equipment, genetics, and fertilizers/herbicides learning how to incorporate those through different classes is a huge advantage. For an example when working on the Ag 450 farm he was given the opportunity of testing a new practice that

he can bring to the home operation. Also being given the opportunity of running his own farm and make his own decisions, allowed him to grow his capabilities that he can take home. Spencer will use his knowledge to adopt new farming practices that are more efficient and cost-effective. He will implement precision agriculture techniques that use data analytics and technology to optimize his crop yields and reduce input costs. He will use techniques such as crop rotation, cover cropping, and integrated pest management to reduce the use of pesticides and fertilizers, to improve soil health, and promote biodiversity within his rotation.

As soon as Spencer step foot on this campus he started making connections that he can use throughout his life. He met the friends that will be in his wedding and who would drop anything if he ever needed help. Through the internships during the summer months and the classes there is no doubt of a benefit of connections from all over the U.S. and knowledge. Coming to college allowed him to mature and grow his professionalism. When was Spencer asked was it worth coming to a university and pay the \$20,000 a year? Spencer says 100% yes and does not regret his choice at all as the value long term outweighs the cost.
